# Top 10 HMinfo Publications Downloaded Since Last Report

#### 1. HMinfo Website

#### Website Progress Report - in pack

CB explained the major upgrades that the website has undergone since the last ACM:

The website has undergone the following major upgrades since the last report:

- Increased Navigation Speed Website-wide optimisations were made to decrease processing speeds and thus improve the user experience, particularly in the Service Directory. Loading time was reduced by approximately 7.5 seconds.
- Font Resizing was demonstrated on screen during the meeting: Modifications were made to the HMinfo website to allow its layout to adjust according to font sizes, eliminating the limitations inherent in fixed layouts combined with variable font sizes. CB explained the toolbar featuring keyboard shortcuts added to the header of the website to provide accessible font resizing controls.
- The ongoing accessibility upgrades are 94% complete at the time of writing. This period included the completion of the HMinfo Website Action Plan report.

1a. HMinfo Website – Discussion about best way to manage labelling or naming fact sheets or papers under group headings. E.g. Bathrooms –" Electrical safety in the bathroom"

**1b. HMinfo Website** – Research indicates that 94% of websites are not fully "accessible" e.g. Trade Build website: <u>http://tradebuild.com.au/search/</u> HMinfo links to many websites and CB stated it's out of scope in our current work plan to address this. The agreed action was that HM info will write to linked services re accessibility. CB also said if funding can be available and there is sufficient interest, HMinfo could facilitate a workshop for construction building companies on how to make their websites more accessible.

# 2. Publications and Research Activities

# 2b) Summary Bulletin: Fire Safety: Smoke Alarms (in pack)

Document included in the AC Members' document package.

During the process of reprinting HMinfo documents, it was clear this publication required a more substantial, and immediate, update. The first edition in 2006 followed the introduction of NSW legislation for battery-powered smoke alarms in all housing. It was quite explanatory (e.g. What is a smoke alarm? Why are smoke alarms important?), for an audience that had limited knowledge. The situation has changed substantially:

- the audience for this Summary Bulletin is now far more knowledgeable
- there have been substantial advances in both smoke alarms products and research
- there was a change to BCA 2014, requiring linked smoke alarms in all new dwellings

The result is a completely new and more comprehensive edition.

#### There was discussion of :

- How many smoke alarms are inappropriately positioned or not the correct type used (e.g. Heat detecting ones for kitchens),
- building constructors cutting costs and using cheaper incorrect versions
- Smoke alarms so sensitive they off at the "drop of a hat" and users covering them with shower caps – defeating the purpose of having them

#### 2c) Set: Fire Safety (in pack)

4 proposals in the AC Members' document package.

The new edition of the Summary Bulletin on Smoke Alarms, and the planned update of the Summary Bulletin on Fire Egress, has led to the proposal for a 'Fire Safety' set.

These Summary Bulletins could be compiled into a book or <sup>1</sup> ISSN Serial on fire safety, which can potentially be listed in <sup>0</sup> Scopus in 2015 (dependent on funding). It would consist <sup>0</sup> of:

- Overview of Fire Safety in the Home (new in 2015)
- Smoke Alarms (new edition)
- Emergency Egress (new edition)
- Fire Sprinklers (new by Adjunct)
- Bushfire Safety (new by Adjunct)

How sprinklers can cause a lot of unnecessary damage when they come on if the system is overly sensitive

# 2d) Summary Bulletin: Slip-resistant floor surfaces (in pack)

Status: final AS updates, then specialist review

Standards Australia's HB197:1999, the handbook that is the main source of guidance for the flooring industry, and a major reference for this Summary Bulletin, has been replaced. The new HB 198:2014 was released in mid-June. The draft Summary Bulletin is currently being updated to reflect the changes, then will go to specialist review.

Consumer Factsheet in pack) Status: in progress

The proposed Protocol was shown in the June ACM. A new electronic proposal form for research by HMinfo/EBEP authors and external authors has been developed. It is being trialled internally before being published on the HMinfo website.

Protocols for each type of HMinfo publication are being written. These will be developed into publication guides for external authors.

#### 5c) Specialist Review Panel Membership

#### 6. Non-HMinfo Funded Projects:

CB provided the following update on other research projects undertaken by EBEP, but relevant to HMinfo:

# 6a) ARC Linkage: Livable Bathrooms - Designing out dependence in activities of daily living

This research is nationally significant and aims to establish the criteria needed for the development of more flexible, innovative and safer bathroom fixtures and domestic bathroom environments for older Australians. Bathrooms are for people, yet there is a lack of reliable and valid data to guide product innovation and the spatial envelopes required for efficient and effective bathroom design.

#### 6b) DIY Home Modifications: Point of Sale Support for People with Disability and their Carers

**Status**: Part one – the positioning paper is complete and published. You can download it <u>here</u>.

Part Two - still ongoing.

**Outline:** The project, funded by ADHC, addresses the knowledge gap in home modifications research by investigating home modifications that are done outside of government-subsided schemes. It aims to address the issue of people opting to undertake home modifications DIY, and purchasing the components from retail stores, catalogues or websites, where they are unlikely to receive information about the suitability of the products, how they are to be installed, or the warranties or ongoing maintenance that they will require. The research goal is to develop information resources to be made available at the Point of Sale (POS) and online for consumers to assist decision making about DIY home modification projects.

• Two surveys are currently running, one for Consumers and one for Industry members. At the time of writing 43 consumer surveys have been completed and 15 industry surveys. We aim to get 15 more industry surveys.

#### 6c) City of Sydney – Liveability app.

The UNSW Liveability application is a tool that can be used on mobile devices, such as iPads, iPhones and Android phones, to collect audio, text, visual and image data about people's perceptions of their town centre. The application (app) is a simple, low-cost method of participatory planning for LGAs that actively engages community members. Using this app, people can rate the features and services of the town centre on their 'liveability', that is, the degree to which the built environment supports the community from a pedestrian mobility perspective.

 6d) Literature Review: Mapping the evidence base on home modification outcomes - Phillippa Carnemolla
Status: The literature review has begun and research is currently being mapped onto a previously designed Matrix.

MB Explained that MOD.A had commissioned a systematic evaluation based review for HMinfo

**7a) IRT Research Fund** – application in partnership with the Community Housing Federation of Australia to look at home modifications in community housing using the Illawarra as the sample area.

**7d) DSS Housing and Homelessness Grants** – application to develop an evidence base and Smartphone app to assist home modification providers and young people with disability (YPD) and their families to determine whether assistive technology (AT) or home modifications (HM) would enable secure accommodation options that provide the best long term support to minimise YPD's ongoing care costs and maximise their independence and community engagement.
